A BRIEF RECAP OF 2016 FROM THE COLONEL

"Over the past year, nine new Officers were sworn in to replace vacancies that existed due to recent retirements. With these new hires, our police department is fully staffed at 153 officers for the first time in several years.

In June 2016, the department took delivery of three new Harley Davidson police motorcycles. These motorcycles are leased from Seacoast Harley Davidson and are operated by members of the Traffic Division and utilized for traffic enforcement, escorts and special events.

The Department's Canine Unit continues to be a valuable resource for our City as well as other law enforcement agencies who have called upon us for mutual aid. Just this year, our K-9 teams have assisted the US Postal Service Inspectors resulting in the seizure of large amounts of narcotics and United States currency. They have also apprehended a breaking and entering suspect in East Greenwich, as well as led to the recovery of two loaded firearms in the

City of Providence, one of which had been used in a shooting and discarded by a suspect who fled from the Providence Police Department on foot.

The Department Training Complex is in the process of being expanded thanks to the donation by the Cranston School Department for two modular classrooms that will serve in part as a virtual training center. This center will allow Officers to be placed in various scenarios that will enhance their training in situations where decisions must be made on the appropriate level of force to be applied. Including lethal force.

Recently, Officer Joshua Mason recently returned to the department after completing a six-month rigorous training United States Army course in the State of Alabama. Officer Mason achieved the rank of Warrant Officer and is now a certified Blackhawk Pilot. He now serves in that capacity as a member of the Rhode Island National Guard.

We have expanded are partnerships with State, Federal and local law enforcement agencies, to include the assignment of a detective to the State Violent Fugitive



Task Force for the purpose of apprehending violent felons that have fled the jurisdiction of the City of Cranston and have committed violent crimes in other communities.

COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIPS FOR FAMILY MEMBERS

With the rising cost of a college education, here are a few pots of money that are offered to the widest group of Law Enforcement Officer (LEO) dependents:

- 1. Children of active duty police officers can apply for The Electronic Security Association's Youth Scholarship Program, which awards two scholarships each year. The first place winner receives \$7,500 and the second-place winner receives \$2,500.
- 2. The 2016 Wives Behind the Badge Law **Enforcement Chil**dren's Scholarship Program provides

two \$1,000 scholarships, annually, to children of law enforcement officers.

- 3. The America's 911 Foundation ships of \$2,000 each year to children of first responders.
- 4. FLEOA Foundation offers children of current. members of the Federal Law En-Association scholarships of \$500 or \$1,000.

For those dependents

that desires to follow in the footsteps of his or her LEO parent or grandparent, these scholarships are great to consider:

- 1. The Sheryl A. Horak Law awards 15 scholar- Enforcement Explorer Memorial Scholarship is a meritbased award worth \$1,000 for high-school seniors looking to pursue a career in law enforcement.
- 2. The O'Grady Memorial Scholarship Fund awards retired or deceased scholarships for students seeking careers in Law Enforcement. The scholarship amount forcement Officers varies each year depending on how much funding is available and how many qualified applicants they receive.

<u>Detective Salvatore L. DeCesare.</u> Born on December 13, 1932, he was the son of the late Salvatore and Julianna (Tokaz) DeCesare. A member of the Army's 7th Cavalry during the Korean War, Sal joined the department in 1961 and retired in 1990 with the rank of Detective. Detective DeCesare passed away on December 11, 2015. He was survived by his wife Helen of 59 years and his daughters Robyn and Kelly and his two grandchildren.

<u>Detective Eugene F. Hackett.</u> Son of the late Eugene and Mary (Moan) Hackett, Gene was Bryant College graduate and served in the U.S. Air Force during the Viet Nam War before joining the CPD where he proudly served for 30 years. Detective Hackett passed away on December 23, 2015. He was survived by his wife Nancy and his children Karen, Christine, Kathleen, William, Jill, and his seven grandchildren.

Lt. Joseph J. Cicione Jr. Son of the late Joseph Sr. and Bertha (Bonhomme) Cicione, Joe was a U.S. Air Force veteran who served during the Korean War and proudly served the citizens of Cranston for twenty years as a member of the department while holding the rank of Lieutenant. TIPS ON HOW TO REDUCE BEING A VICTIM OF CREDIT CARD FRAUD

- 1. Sign any new cards immediately.
- Carry your cards separately from your cash wallet.
- After you hand your card over to pay, keep it in view when you can.
- 4. Don't sign a blank receipt. Draw a line
- through any space above the total amount if you don't intend to authorize additional charges.
- 5. Void all carbon copies and incorrect receipts.
- 6. Save all receipts in a safe place.
- 7. Open your statements as soon as you get

- them, and reconcile your card accounts every month.
- 8. Report any suspicious activity on your card immediately.
- 9. Notify your card company when you'll ne travelling or changing residences.
- 10. Never put your card

- number on a postcard, the outside of envelops, or in a photo online.
- 11. Do not give your card number over the phone unless you initiated the transaction and you know the company is reputable.
- 12. Always destroy receipts by using a shredder or cutting them into small pieces.
