HOW CRANSTON'S TRAINING ACADEMY EVOLVED

Chief James Miller established the first in-service training school for Cranston police officers in 1936, a move that was considered extremely innovative for the time. Up until this point, Cranston trained its new officers the way most Rhode Island departments did, by pairing a rookie with a dues, please send a \$25.00 senior officer for a few days or weeks. After that, no further training had been required.

I once had the opportunity to talk with Terrance McKaig, who came on the department in February of 1936. He related how his firearms training consisted of going with a sergeant to a wooded area off Phenix Ave. and shooting a .22 pistol at a target taped to a tree. Times were certainly different. (Off. McKaig served for ten years before accepting a position with the

In 1956, Chief Louis Fouchecourt established the first recruit training academy, which most of us recall having to pass as part of our job application process.

In 1963, Chief Fouchecourt obtained the site where the present-day Cranston Police Training Academy is located.

The site, which was once a quarry, was initially used as a shooting range. Not long afterward, a one-room building to be used as a classroom was added.

The first classroom was actually a former flower shop which stood on

Wellington Ave. that was slated for demolition. The chief arranged for it to be moved by the city to the range, where it still sits today.

A few months later a cinder block building was constructed next to the classroom building.

By the 1980s the department was in need of larger training facilities, and a modern classroom building was constructed on the site in 1989.

In the ensuing years Cranston's training academy has grown to include more classroom buildings, a secondary shooting range, a repelling tower, and obstacle course.

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
New Patches












Many officers have dedicated at least one uniform shirt with Velcro on it to make for easy transference of the patches as they are issued.


